

The football game in Salem yesterday afternoon could better have been played on skates. The Newburyport High School team lost to the High Schools of the Witch City by 13 to 4, but there was ample reason for the defeat. The local team is a light one and depends upon end plays, dodging, while Salem's heavy met do their best work in bucking the centre. The ball ground on Bridge street was covered with frozen snow, and was so alippery that it was impossible for resistance by the lighter line of Newburyport and dodging was almost imposed ble.

When the men arrived on the field no preparations had been made whatever for the game.
