





Ladd, Pollard added to NHS Wall

Although they played quarterback in different eras nearly 40 years apart, the two newest members of Newburyport High School's Wall of Fame shared a single thought during Friday afternoon's induction luncheon at 10 Center Street.

"It took the other 10 guys to help me – it wasn't just me. They did all the dirty work," said 1931 graduate Edwin "Spud" Pollard.

"I was fortunate to play with the people I played with. We had such talent. There were times I would fake to the fullback or tailback and just walk into the endzone untouched," said 1970 graduate Ken Ladd.

Pollard and Ladd had their plaques unveiled at World War Memorial Stadium Friday morning prior to the luncheon, then were introduced at halftime of Friday night's varsity game between Newburyport and Triton. Their induction brings to 17 the number of former NHS athletes, coaches and administrators to be honored since the Wall of Fame was established

Pollard was quarterback of the 1929 and 1930 NHS squads that compiled a 16-4-2 record under Wall of Fame coach Del Borah. He ranks 30th on the school's all-time scoring list with 81 points. A true triple threat, he also punted and was the school's last effective drop-kicker.

He is also regarded as one of the top baseball shortstops ever to play at NHS. A three-year starter and career .300 hitter, he was noted for great range and a strong, accurate arm.

The high school did not have an official hockey team at that time, but Pollard excelled as a member of the Amesbury Maples.

He attended Kent's Hill in Maine where he led the football team to back-to-back undefeated seasons, served as captain of the hockey team and played two vears of baseball.

"Spud Pollard was a legend at Newburyport High School long before a lot of us knew where Newburyport High School was," said Wall of Fame Selection Committee Member Norm Doyle. "Spud quarterbacked probably one of the finest teams ever to come out of Newburyport High School and was one of those fast, slippery little guys you couldn't get hold of.

"Later I had the real privilege of playing (semi-pro) baseball with Spud. There are at least two people in this room who can verify this. Spud Pollard had the greatest arm from shortstop that I have ever seen and that's major league, minor league and every other league you can play in. He had a range like you wouldn't believe and an arm like a rifle," said Doyle, a first baseman and the recipient of countless Pollard peas during their days in the old Twi-Light League.

"It makes you feel pretty good to be able to say thank you - thank you very much," said Pollard, 80. Induction, page B3

Ladd was a Northeastern Conference all-star in football, basketball and baseball.

Heranks 12th on the school's football scoring list with 16 touchdowns and 104 points. After playing tightend as a junior, he moved to quarterback his senior year, passing for seven touchdowns and running for 12 more.

A three-year starting center/forward in basketball, the 6-1 Ladd was noted for his fierce rebounding and physical play and ranks 11th on the school's all-time scoring list with 651 points.

In baseball, Ladd was starting catcher as a junior then shifted to the outfield as a senior, earning Class B honorable mention recognition.

He went on to Boston College where he was the starting safety and captain of the Eagles' 1975 team. He later taught and coached in the Amesbury school system before moving into private business.

"Kenny Ladd did so many things for Newouryport High School as a three-sport athlete.

That's very difficult because we have very few three-sport athletes nowadays. In football, he probably could've played anywhere – he was tough," said Wall of Fame Selection Committee member Jim Stehlin, Ladd's coach.

"I liked my quarterbacks to break in on defense as sophomores or juniors, but I never liked them to play once they became the quarterback. In Kenny's situation I just couldn't keep him off the field," said Stehlin.

Stehlin recalled a game against Swampscott when Newburyport took over on downs on its own 14 after Swampscott had a 1st-and-goal at the Clippers' seven.

"Kenny made all the tackles. I know that when the B.C. coaches saw that film, they wanted Kenny. He went on to great things as an outstanding defensive back at a major college," said Stehlin.

Ladd said, "this is the nicest award I've ever received and I'm sure the nicest I ever will."

He credited a close-knit family with much of

his athletic success.





For the seniors, reaching the Super Bowl is a partial completion of a voyage that began for many of them as sophomore starters on the 1991 team that won only three games.

"It's a goal we've finally reached. I'm happy — very happy!" said senior co-captain Seamus McCormick, a 218-pound linebacker, offensive tackle and part-


time fullback.

Port's Rymsha picked as ECAC Rookie of the Year

WALTHAM — Bentley College sophomore quarterback Mike Rymsha of Newburyport (NHS, '91), who helped lead the Falcons to a 10-0 season, has been named the ECAC/Budget Division II Rookie of the Year in a vote of ECAC coaches and sports information directors.

Rymsha, who took over as Bentley's quarterback midway through the fifth game of the season, completed 59.9 percent of his passes (91 of 152) for 1,365 yards and a school record-typing 14 touchdowns. His pass efficiency rating of 156.49 was the third highest in New England

Division II history. His final TD pass of the season was his most memorable and most important. It came with Bentley trailing Stonehill by five in the waning seconds of the season finale. After scrambling to elude the sack and while being dragged down by a Chieftain defender, he launched a 19-yard scoring strike to fullback Brandon Hight to give Bentley a 27-26 lead with 10 seconds left, salvaging a perfect season and a second consecutive Eastern Collegiate football Conference championship.

Rymsha, who was named All-ECFC as well, earned ECAC Division II Rookie of the Week honors three times during the final six weeks of the season. A transfer from Colgate University, he was slowed by injuries during preseson and did not see any action in the first two games. He was used to run the 2-minute drill the next two weeks before taking over from freshman Jason Danella against Assumption. He made his first start a week later against Siena.

His most effective outing came in his second start, a 34-7 win over Western New England. Rymsha was as perfect as a QB can be against the Golden Bears, completing 15 of 17 passes (with one dropped) for 283 yards and 3 TDs in one half of play.

Bashaw named Exeter MVP

Gravelle named to all-star teams

EXETER, N.H.— Newbury-port's Erik Bashaw, a one-year post-graduate at Phillips Exeter Academy, was awarded the Robert C. Mason Trophy as the football team's Most Valuable Player at the fall sports awards assembly.

In naming Bashaw the winner of the award, Athletic Director Dana Barbin called his performance "one of the finest seasons by any kid in any sport."

Bashaw led the team all season with "determination and talent," Barbin said of the starting offensive back. Head football coach Ed Frey called Bashaw a "pure athlete combining the qualities of desire and humility as a person and as an athlete."

In total offense, Bashaw scored 13 touchdowns, rushed for 1,241 yards and amassed more than 2,000 all-purpose yards, all school records. The 1993 team was only the third ever at Exeter to winseven games, finishing the season with an outstanding 7-2 record.

As a senior at Newburyport High School last season, Bashaw rushed for 1,157 yards and 12 TDs. He ranks seventh on the school's all-time career rushing list. Meanwhile, former Newburyport High captain Nathan Gravelle (NHS, '90), a senior at Massachusetts Maritime Academy, was recently selected to the ECAC and New England Football Conference first team all-star teams.

In addition, he was co-recipient of the distinguished Hal Chalmers Award given annually to the top scholar/athlete in the NEFC. Gravelle, a captain of the '93 squad who was selected for his play at offensive tackle, was a two-way starter and totaled 40 tackles on defense. He earned first-team all-NEFC recognition last season as a defensive lineman.

Gravelle, the fifth Academy student athlete to win the Chalmers Award since MMA joined the Conference in 1974, shared the 1993 award with Steve Roberge of U.Mass Dartmouth. All-star and Chalmers Award recipients are selected by a vote of the nine Conference head football coaches.

For Port, '93 was season of accomplishment

It is inevitable, perhaps, that there are those who measured the Newbury-port high football team's season by its final two games—both losses.

In so doing, they chose to overlook a season which produced a nine-game winning streak, the school's first Cape Ann League championship since 1980 and the Clippers' first post-season appearance since 1977.

Season-ending losses to Amesbury (14-0) on Thanksglving and Arlington Catholic (27-20) in the Div. 4B Super Bowl may have tarnished the luster a bit.

However, the defeats in no way diminished the accomplishments of a team sixth year coach Ed Gaudiano felt met the steep expectations of others.

"You can't take anything array for the steep expectations of the steep expectatio

"You can't take anything away from our seniors — what they did and how they went about it. For high school them to win a title. No one can question their desire and commitment. They did about," said Gaudiano, annoyed by as-your-last-game" stance.

"Even before (the seniors) got to high school, there were high expectations put on them by others. To me, that's unfair. But, they handled it as a group and they banded together, And, they were very talented," he said.

Included in that group were five senior all-CAL selections — tailback Scott Sullivan, quarterback Rob Theroux, and tackle Seamus McCormick on offense; and tackle Brian Ladd and defensive back Mike Nyhan-Hall on plefense.

*Sullivan, the offensive workhorse and co-captain, accounted for more than 60 percent of the team's rushing attempts while setting school single-season records with 222 carries and 1,365 vards. He scored 12 TDs, added five interceptions at defensive safety, and finished his career as the school's third all-time leading rusher with 1,824 vards.

"It was great to see him come back from his injury," said Gaudiano, referring to the broken foot that shelved Sullvan for his final six games as a junior. "He was our centerpiece, the go-to guy, and fulfilled everyone's expectations and more."

After a year away from the game, Theroux was a revelation as a quarter-back and kicker. He completed 60-of-128 passes for 890 yards and five TDs and rushed for another 203 yards and five TDS. He set a school single season and

career record with six field goals including a record 41-varder in a dramatic mid-season win against co-champion Ipswich. He also did all the punting and kicking off.

"He's just a great athlete. What you saw was the value of Jimmy (Stehlin) working with him and helping turn the athleticism into a quarterback," said Gaudiano.

Nyhan-Hall, a wide receiver and kick returner, brought flair to the offense and led the team with 26 receptions for 407 yards. Despite sitting out the season opener, he amassed nearly 1,000 all-purpose yards and six TDs — all from long distance. A cornerback on defense, he always covered the opposition's top receiver.

"Mike made a position switch (from running back) and really worked at it. He was a very effective wideout and created a lot of big plays," said Gaudiano.

McCormick, the co-captain, bounced between fullback and tackle on offense and anchored the defense at linebacker, where he was an all-CAL pick as a junior.

"We asked a lot of him and he could've won any award we gave out. He got it done for three years," said Gaudiano.

Ladd played most of the season with a severely sprained ankle but it didn't hinder his play at defensive tackle and

offensive tightend. He was the Clippers't best run defender and also had a teambest yards.per-catch average of 20.3 with 11 receptions for 224 yards.

"Brian played the year on one foot and the second half of the Super Bowl with an injured shoulder. He was a pure player with a lot of heart," said Gaudiano.

Many other seniors contributed mightily.

Three-year starting defensive bookends Jason Gagnon and Eric Marshall—overlooked in the all-league selections but clearly deserving of the honor—combined for 9 1/2 quarterback in tackles and brought offensive depth to several positions.

Brad Pettingell, a converted quarter-back, developed into a reliable possession receiver (13 catches, 184 yards, 2 TDs) and cornerback. Chad Gerber, a full-time starter for the first time in the defensive backfield, made all of the defensive calls.

Rob Burrier, Rob Merenda, Dana Hart, Matt Smart and Matt Porter were key two-way linemen for an offense which averaged 198.4 rushing yards and 274.9 total yards per game and helped the defense limit opponents to just over 200 yards and 10 first downs per game.

Brandon Ward and Bill Lester proved to be valuable role players while Sean Maguire, Chuck Spaulding and Bill Lester performed well on the special teams.

"This group had a certain camaraderie. I'm sure another like it will come along some time, but these kids had something special going for them," said Gaudiano.

Veteran trainer Howie Salt came in for overdue praise as well.

"Howie did an unbeliebable job in the training room. There was a constant worry every week about three, four or five starters but Howie did a great job getting them ready to play and back on the field," said Gaudiano.

A season-opening four-game winning streak put the Clippers in position to take on two-time defending league and Super Bowl champion Ipswich in a mid-season showdown. The Clippers prevailed, 14-13, in one of the finest games of the past 25 years when Theroux engineered a game-winning six-minute drive, scoring the TD before firing the decisive two-point conversion pass to Nyhan-Hall with little more than two min-

utes to play.

"That was the psychological barrier we had to get over. Robbie just took charge, took the game over. After that, there was recognition that he had to be reckoned with," said Gaudiano.

A clearcut knockout of North Reading preceded a wild 19-16 overtime win at Triton. The Clippers wasted a 10-0 halftime lead and fell behind, 16-10, midway through the final period. They tied it on a 69-yard scoring pass from Theroux to Nyhan-Hall. After the Vikes' apparent game-winning TD was wiped out in the final minute of regulation, Theroux kicked the winning field goal in OT.

"That was an impossible win. But, all season, the kids didn't crack when things went bad. They handled the highs and lows," said Guadiano.

Lopsided wins against North Andover and Lynnfield clinched a share of the league title and postseason berth before Amesbury and Arlington Catholic halted the Clippers' bid for perfection.

"We recognize that the Amesbury rivalry is very big and it's disappointing not having beaten them for three years. We have to find a way to turn that around.

"The Super Bowl? The kids bounced back and performed well. I can't be prouder of the way they played," said Gaudian.

Four join NHS Wall of Fame

NEWBURYPORT — The four latest inductees to the Newburyport High School Wall of Fame — Mary Woodsum Dugrenier, Norman H. Doyle, Leonard "Buddy" Knox and the late Francis T. Bresnahan — had their plaques unveiled Wednesday morning at ceremonies at World War Memorial Stadium.

The unveilings were followed by the Wall of Fame luncheon at Ten Center Street where chairman of the Wall of Fame selection committee chairman Paul Reilly — a 1989 inductee — served as Master of Ceremonies.

Each honoree was presented with a framed certificate commerating the occasion. They bring to 21 the number of men and women so honored since the Wall of Fame was established in 1982.

NHS principal Mary Larnard introduced Dugrenier, who coached nine undefeated Clipper basketball teams from 1963 to 1972 and put together a record 100-game winning streak. She also coached field hockey and was responsible for the establishment of Sportsnight and The Girls' Leaders Club at NHS.

"She has single-handedly done more to model, provoke and foster a belief in the efficacy of women's sports than anyone I've ever met," said Larnard of Dugrenier,

Doyle's son Kevin, the Sports Editor of the Daily News, introduced his father, outlining his unwavering support of NHS athletics during his 40 years of service on the Newburyport school committee.

He was followed by Doyle's lifetime friend, former teammate and fellow 1938 NHS graduate Larry Gravelle, who recounted some of Norm's athletic accomplishments as a letterman in football, basketball and baseball.

"You always knew where he stood and you always got an answer," remarked Gravelle of Doyle. "I knew when I met Norman in 1933 that he would always be my friend."

"His service on the school committee over the last 40 years has nothing to do with personal gain or

personal satisfaction. Rather this was a career of committment, of taking a stand and having the courage to stand by his conviction. First and formost his was a career devoted to the students of Newburyport High School," added Doyle's son Kevin.

Knox's son Paul recounted several humorous stories about his father, who served as NHS athletic director when Paul was growing up. A multi-sport athlete, Knox captained the 1940 Clipper football team and scored the first touchdown ever at World War Memorial Stadium.

Following military service in World War II, he went on to be a standout two-way football player at Tufts, also serving as captain, before returning to Newburyport as a math teacher, head football coach, AD and, eventually, assistant superintendent of schools.


In delivering a moving tribute to his long-time friend, the late Super-intendent Bresnahan, Norm Doyle said: "From his early years as faculty manager of athletics through his tenure as high school principal and, finally, superintendant of

schools, he advocated a sound mind and strong body."

Steve Bresnahan accepted his father's certificate on behalf of his mother, brothers and sisters, saying, "He understood better than many of his peers that each of these activities (history, english, math, science, athletics and others) are vitally important to the total education of the individual. Life is not one-dimensional."

Sports historian Bert Spofford capped the affair by giving personalized scrapbooks to Knox that traced his entire NHS athletic career and another to Mrs. Bresnahan that did the same for the careers of her three sons, Michael, Stephen and Kevin. Spofford earlier presented earlier books to the Doyles and regretted that he didn't have one for Dugrenier because his research hasn't included women's sports.

The inductees were introduced again at halftime of yesterday's game between Newburyport and Amesbury.

Four added to NHS Wall of Fame

NEWBURYPORT – Last week's election of four members brings to 21 the number of individuals honored on Newburyport High School's Wall of Fame since its

inception in 1982.

This year's inductees are: retiring Superintendent Francis T. Bresnahan; outgoing school committee member and three-sport athlete Norman H. Doyle; former athlete, coach, Athletic Director and Assistant Superintendent Leonard "Buddy" Knox; and former women's three-sport coach Mary Woodsom DuGrenier, the architect of a winning streak unmatched in school history.

Thirteen of the 18 individuals nominated received at least one vote. A two-thirds vote of the selection committee was required for

induction.

Prior to voting, the committee agreed to a one-year suspension of the rule limiting eligibility for coaches, administrators and others to five years following the completion of their active service to NHS athletics.

Plaques for this year's honorees will be unveiled on Wednesday, Nov. 24 followed by a luncheon at Ten Center Street. Beginning this year, plaques will be placed on the rear outside wall of the high school gymnasium, facing the football stadium.

The inductees will also be introduced at halftime of the Thanksgiving Day football game between Amesbury and Newburyport.

Beginning in 1949 as the school Faculty Manager of Athletics and continuing affirough tenures as both high school principal and Superintendent, Bresnahan has been a staunch supporter of the high school athletic program.

Under his guidance, the school's varsity programs have expanded and its facilities have improved dramatically. He was instrumental in the move from the Northeastern Conference to the Cape Ann League and worked tirelessly for the construction of new facilities such as the Fuller Field complex on Low Street.

Throughout his 40 years on the School Committee, Doyle has been a leading advocate of the school's athletic programs. He led the push to add nine varsity sports; was instrumental in the hiring of top quality Athletic Directors and coaches; and fought to upgrade existing facilities and to build new ones.

A 1938 graduate of NHS, Doyle was a multi-letterman as a baseball first baseman, basketball center and football quarterback. As a senior, he played a key role in the Clippers' drive to the 1938 Northeastern Conference basketball championship. In baseball, he hit 314 while fielding 1.000.

Knox has been involved in NHS athletics for more than 40 years. An outstanding multi-sport athlete, he captained the 1940 football team and scored the first Newburyport touchdown in World War Memorial Stadium. He later served as football captain at Tufts University.

Knox coached the Clippers in football for three seasons from 1957-59 before going on to successful careers as equipment manager, Athletic Director and Assistant Superintendent.

From 1961-71, DuGrenier coached three sports, making her mark in field hockey and basketball.

Her first basketball team compiled an 8-5 record, including a 33-30 win against Amesbury that snapped the Indians' 27-game winning streak. What followed was a streak of seven straight undefeated seasons, comprising the bulk of a 100-game winning streak that eventually covered 10 years. Her field hockey teams had eight straight winning seasons from 1962-69 and she compiled an overall mark of 49-18-10.

DuGrenier also founded the Girls Student Leaders Club at the high school and initiated Sportsnight, an annual competitive gymnastics show involving 200 to 300 girls.







New-look Clippers will battle youth

Defending co-champs have undergone a transformation

There is a sense of intrigue about this year's Newburyport

High football team.

A year ago, everyone expected the Clippers to contend for the Cape Ann League championship which they shared with Ipswich before representing the CAL in the Div. 4B Super Bowl.



Nineteen seniors — including five All-League performers and seven three-year starters — graduated from the school's first championship club in more than a decade. Only a handful of players from that 9-2-0 team return with significant varsity experience.

So, the Clippers should be content learning the basics and enjoying whatever success comes their way, right?

Not likely.

The heavy loss of seniors is a league-wide phenomenon that impacted nearly every team. Few have more than a handful of seasoned varsity players. Fewer still have a blend of experience in all necessary areas.

Still, few pundits have mentioned the Clippers in pre-season, which seems fine with seventh-year coach Ed Gaudiano (38-24-0,

.613 pct.).

, "I like that. This team needs a chance to get its feet on the ground. I think we have the right guys out there and the kids have really latched onto a new system. The important thing for them is to gain their confidence," said Gaudiano.

The Clippers fared well in all but one scrimmage in the preseason — capped by last Saturday's 39-6 rout of Don Bosco — and seem to have reason for optimism.

"I think we really have shown we can overcome the loss (of 19 seniors). We have a real good mix with kids from all three classes contributing. That's really important. The kids have fit into their roles and know they have to help each other handle the highs and lows," said Gaudiano, whose club will dress 30 underclassmen.

In addition to battling youth, the Clippers have also undergone an operational overhaul.

Offensive coordinator Thom Connors, the former Whittier head coach, dumped the Power-I formation of recent seasons in favor of a multiple attack with distinct Wing-T tendencies. And, in an effort to take advantage of quicker personnel, the Clippers have shifted to "53" and "44" defensive sets.

"With this offense, with its misdirection, you will see a different rhythm to the game. We'll spread the wealth around. Defensively, gang-tackling will be the key because we're probably 20 pounds per man lighter than we've been in recent years," Gaudiano said.

Junior Steve Ladd (6-1, 170) won a three-way battle at quarterback with a consistently productive training camp.

"He definitely had the best preseason and it was a clear decision," said Gaudiano.

Speedy senior wideout Charlie Ferlauto (6-0, 145), junior tightend Chris Hale (6-1, 170) and shifty junior flanker Steve Todd (a 5-5, 136-pound transfer from Kentucky) have emerged as his primary targets. Senior tightend

Mike Kiggins (6-1, 200), senior flanker Tom Farrell (5-7, 135) and junior receiver Kyle Reardon (5-11, 140) add depth.

Senior captain Todd Langis (6-0, 220), a converted fullback, anchors the line at right guard. He'll be joined by junior center Pat Broderick (5-11, 250), senior tackles Chris Bielecki (6-1, 210) and Matt Simons (6-1, 220) and senior guard Mike Barber (5-10, 220), a transfer from Oxford (Mass.) where he was this year's captain-elect. Juniors Craig Blomberg (6-0, 275) and Shaun Burrier (6-2, 200) and sophomore Pat McCormick (6-2, 200) will all see considerable action.

Shawn McCarthy, a 5-10, 200-pound fullback, is the lone senior in the backfield. Juniors Mike Ladd (HB, 5-8, 160) and Brett Bashaw (FB/HB, 6-2, 175) logged limited duty last year and will be joined by junior transfer Pat Barber (HB/FB, 5-11, 170) and junior Nathan Fuller (FB, 5-7, 165).

On the defensive side Langis and sophomore Tom Coehlo (6-2, 165) are the defensive ends with one moving to linebacker when the Clippers shift to a four-man front. They flank an interior group of the noseguard McCarthy and tackles Mike Barber and Simons.

Bashaw and Pat Barber man the interior linebacker slots.

Cornerbacks Todd, Mike Ladd, Steve Ladd and Ferlauto and safeties James Madore, Hale, Reardon and Fuller will patrol the secondary. One strong safety (Hale or Fuller) will rotate up to linebacker depending on the set.

Gaudiano said each of the transfers has a chance to make

major contributions.

"The Barbers are just great kids. I can't explain them any other way than to say they're just football players, serious football players. Todd is a great addition. He makes us awfully fast in the backfield and has a chance to be our big-play guy," said Gaudiano.


The kicking game, often overlooked but inevitably important, will be handled by sophomore kicker Jason Haberland and the junior punter Bashaw.

How does Gaudiano view the


league?

"A lot of teams are in the same situation as us. We think we'll be all right once we get the experience. Triton, North Andover, Masconomet and Pentucket seem to have the most back," he said.







Rymsha earns academic honor

WALTHAM — The honors continue to pile up for Bentley College's record-setting junior quarterback Mike Rymsha of Newburyport.

On Monday, the 1991 Newburyport High graduate was one of two Falcons selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSI-DA) to the GTE Academic All-District 1 college division football team. He is now on the national ballot for GTE Academic All-America considera-

Rymsha carries a 3.47 GPA as a marketing major.

Rymsha also earned recognition yesterday as the weekly Coca-Cola Gold Helmet Award winner for the college division after leading Bentley to a 22-13 win over C.W. Post in Saturday's ECAC Intercollegiate Football Conference Div. II Bowl Game.

In that game, he passed completed 20-of-30 passes for three touchdowns and 226 yards to earn MVP honors as Bentley capped a perfect 11-0 season. It was his fourth three-TD game of the season.

Last week, Rymsha was selected as the Eastern Collegeiate Football Conference Player of the Year. For the season, he passed for a school record 19 TDs and rushed for four more. Rymsha completed 109-of-186 passes for 1,433 yards and just seven interceptions and ranked 15th nationally in Div. II passing efficiency.

Rymsha named Player of the Year

The first post-season honor has arrived for Bentley College quarterback Mike Rymsha of New-

buryport-The record-setting junior has been selected the Eastern Collegiate Football Conference's Player of the Year after leading the Falcons (10-0) to their second consecutive undefeated season and a berth in tomorrow's ECAC Intercollegiate Football Conference Div. II Bowl Game against C.W. Post (Bentley, noon).

As triggerman of the Bently offense that averaged 44 points per game, Rymsha completed 59 percent of his passes for 1,433 yards and a school record 16 touchdowns while throwing only seven interceptions. The 6-2, 200-pounder now has 30 career TD passes.

The 1991 Newburyport High

graduate was the ECAC Div. II Rookie of the year last season. Rymsha is Newburyport's alltime career passing leader with 2,988 yards and shares the lead for career TD passes (27) with Wake Forest Hall of Famer Larry Russell. In three years as a starter, Rymsha guided the Clippers to a 21-9 record.

Bentley coach Peter Yetten was selected ECFC Coach of the Year for the third straight season and senior defensive end Andrew Quinn was selected the league's Outstanding Lineman. In all, 11 Bentley players were selected ECFC first-team all-stars and four received second-team recognition.

Senior wide receiver Jason Ryder of Salisbury (Triton, '91) earned honorable mention recognition.



College quarterback Mike Rymsha of Newburyport took a snap from center during a practice. He dropped back four steps looked from left to right

and drilled a hard 15-yard downand-out pass to former high school teammate and wide receiver Jonathan Story.

Bentley offensive backfield coach Bob Connors grinned and said softly, "Perfect ... just perfect. But don't tell Mike."

Moments later Rymsha took another snap. His blockers protected nim well and he rifled a 40-yard pass to Jason Ryder of Salisbury.

Connors grinned again and said softly, "Perfect . . . perfect. But don't tell Mike."

Connors was an outstanding quarterback at Northeastern University, was named NU's Most Valuable Player in 1969 and he's still in the NU record book as the Huskies 10th all-time career passer.

Said Connors, "Mike has come a long way. I don't praise him too much. I push him. He knows where I'm coming from. I just want him to advance to the next level."

Last season Bentley posted a 10-0 record and Rymsha played a major role in the team's success. He was named the 1993 ECAC Division 2 Rookie of the Year and was selected by College Football Preview as a preseason Division 2 All-America this season. Last year Rymsha was seventh in Division 2 in pass efficiency, completing 60 percent of his passes for 1,365 yards and a school-record-tying 14 touchdowns.

Rymsha was the starting quarterback at Newburyport High School for three seasons as his teams posted 6-4, 7-3 and 8-2 records in the Cape Ann League under head coach Ed Guadiano.

"I had fun in high school," says Rymsha. "I was playing with a great bunch of guys. The only disappointment I had was as a senior. We had a fine year, but Triton Regional went 9-1 and won the league title." Rymsha entered Colgate University, was redshirted his first year and played junior varsity ball as a sophomore.

"Colgate's a fine school and all that," says Rymshc. "I was doing well in the classroom and all that. But I wasn't totally happy. When I came home after my second year some friends talked me into staying in this area and maybe to get into Bentley. I did miss being close to home and made the change. Best move I ever made. Right now I'm in a great business course and last term I had a 3.8 grade index which pleased me no end. I really feel comfortable here and I hope to produce as a student and as an athlete."

Last year as a redshirt sophomore, Rymsha was injured (hamstring) in the preseason. He missed some practice sessions, and the first two games, but he bounced back nicely.

Bentley head coach Peter Yetten explained: "Mike's a real quality student-athlete who waited for his chance. We started freshman Jason Danella at quarterback in our first four games starting with UMass-Lowell and Mass. Maritime. Then Mike saw some quality playing time in our next two games against Nichols and Curry. Then he came off the bench against Assumption in our fifth game and threw two touchdown passes."

Rymsha made his first start against Siena and passed for 255 yards. He started the last four games of the season and overall he completed 91 of 152 passes for a .600

Four join NHS Wall of Fame

NEWBURYPORT — The Newburyport High School Wall of Fame grew to 25 members with the induction of four former athletes Friday.

Gail (Pettengill) Kelleher (1964), Angelo "Junior" Dagres (1953), Frank Serwon (1955) and Mike Foley (1974) were honored with a plaque unveiling at the high school and an induction luncheon at Ten Center Street.

Kelleher, the successful field hockey coach at Amesbury High since 1969, is the third woman inductee, following Margaret (Bean) Gould and Mary (Woodsom) DuGrenier. A three-sport athlete, Kelleher is viewed as the best field hockey player in NHS history.

"Mary (DuGrenier) called here (Kelleher) the best she ever coached," said former Newburyport Athletic Director Leonard "Buddy" Knox, who presented Kelleher.

"I feel extremely honored to be a member of the Wall of Fame. I feel even better because two of the people who mean the most to me, Peg Gould and Mary Woodsom DuGrenier, preceded me," said Kelleher.

Kelleher credited much of her success as a player and a coach to DuGrenier, saying her former coach provided her with "a chance to channel my athletic abilities and all my competitiveness."

She also said that Knox "was way ahead of his time in recognizing girls sports."

As a player, Kelleher was a member of the NHS field hockey team that broke the long unbeaten streaks of both Exeter High School and Amesbury High. She also played softball and basketball and, as a senior, was a member of the NHS team that started a nine-year undefeated streak in basketball that reached 100 games.

"I'm doing the thing that I most wanted to do in life and I try very hard to pass on all those wonderful things that I earned at Newbury-port High School from those people who meant so much to me," said Kelleher.

Dagres is regarded as the best baseball and basketball player in school history.

He still holds school records for single-season (.679 in 1953) and career batting averages and is the leader in countless other offensive categories as well. In basketball, he remains the school's all-time scoring leader with 1,350 career points and averaged 38 points per game. He was a two-time All-Scholastic selection in both sports and was All-New England in both as a senior.

After starring for two years at the University of Rhode Island, Dagres signed a Major League contract with the Baltimore Orioles. His career was prematurely shortened by arm and shoulder injuries, but he remains the only NHS graduate ever to play in the Majors.

"Junior was exceptional. He is without question the greatest basketball and baseball player in the history of the school. In his freshman year he hit .434 and I batted .389. I was a senior and I was embarrassed," said Doug MacBurnie, who presented Dagres.

Dagres thanked his son Troy and daughter-in-law Stephanie for nominating him.


He then recounted a story about the time baseball coach Walter Sheridan benched because he had missed the previous day's game.

"There were 30 scouts there to see me, but he said 'If you're as good as they think you are and as good as you think you are, they'll be back'," Dagres said with a laugh. "I'd just like to thank all the coaches and players who made this possible."

Serwon was a two-way starting lineman for three years in football and captained the 1954 team. In track, he was undefeated in dual meet competition in the shot put as a senior and won the Essex County Meet title. He also played basket-

year coach Sheridan's eye as a sophomore in 1952—the year after the school's 99-6 Thanksgiving Day loss to Amesbury.

Sheridan recalled that Serwon was one of only 18 players who started and finished the 6-3 season, although interest grew and a large group of players joined the squad after pre-season practice. He cited Serwon's oustanding effort that season against Amesbury's legendary Tino Bertollini, widely thought of as the best high school lineman in the state, in a 15-12 Thanksgiving Day loss.

Sheridan said Serwon was equally effective as a run and pass blocker and his downfield speed helped the Clippers to run a wide open attack

"I want to thank Walter for nominating me and the committee for electing me — this is probably the greatest thing that's ever happened to me," said Serwon, who in later years continued his service to NHS athletics as a long-time member and officer of the Boosters Club.

Foley was a three-year starter and all-league selection in both football (center) and baseball (catcher). He captained the Clippers' 1973 Cape Ann League championship football team and was selected to the National High School All-100 team.

He went on to earn all-East recognition on the best Colgate University team of the modern era and served as head coach of his alma mater for five years. He is currently the offensive coordinator at Harvard University.

Foley was presented by his former coach, Jim Stehlin.

"In my estimation, Mike is the image of what Newburyport High School football should be. He did everything I wanted a player to do. He never boasted and didn't brag, but he led by example. To me, he is one of the great rewards for being a high school coach," said Stehlin.

"It's an honor, a privilege, to be associated with the people on that Wall. I really enjoyed sports all my life and Newburyport is a great town for it." Foley said.

town for it," Foley said.

"Mr. Stehlin taught us how to play with class. I also owe a great deal of thanks to my parents. My dad instilled my work ethic in me and my mom was always there to give me encouragement and for me to talk to. The two of them made a great combination," he concluded.



alist, the Clippers took sole possession of second place in the CAL with a solid 7.2

(7-3) season.

"I guess we may have surprised some people, but I don't think we were that surprised as coaches. We knew we had some talented kids and that once they got used to the varsity game and once the offense fell into place we could be good," said coach Ed Gaudiano (7 years, 45-27-0), who now ranks second in school history for career wins.

Gaudiano said a season-opening 28-21 loss to Bedford — a game the Clippers led, 21-6, midway through the third period — set the team on the course to eventual success.

"The wake-up call was delivered by Bedford. That was a good lesson for the kids to learn and they grew up quickly into varsity roles," he said.

"It was a year where each game was exciting, challenging and fun. When you look at how far these kids came from the opener to the final game against Amesbury, it was very enjoyable," he said.

Gaudiano praised the leadership of a hard-working senior class. "We had some good kids who had been kept off the field by the previous class. I'm really impressed with the way they stepped up and the leadership roles they assumed.

"A big key was Todd Langis making the move from fullback to the offensive line to help the team. He did all the right things and was a very good captain," said Gaudiano.

Langis and fellow co-captain Matt Simons, both all-CAL picks, were joined by seniors Chris

Bieleckf and Mike Barber, junior Pat Broderick and sophomore Pat McCormick on an offensive line Gaudiano felt was critical to the team's success.

"The line was the glue to this team, a real strongpoint — we wouldn't have been anywhere without those guys," said the coach.

Their consistent play allowed Offensive Coordinator Thom Connors' re-tooled offense time to develop into a multi-faceted weapon

Their numbers — 17.2 points and 220.3 yards per game — weren't gaudy but the Clippers' balance kept many opponents off guard.

Bashaw, an all-CAL linebacker, led the team with six take



Hale hauled in a team-high 19 receptions good for 319 yards and two TDs a year ago and added three interceptions on defense. He follows his father Bill, the 1969 NHS captain, as a Clipper captain.

When Newburyport High senior Mike Ladd scored four touchdowns in the Clippers' 34-0 Thanksgiving Day win against Amesbury, he became only the 11th player in the school's 105 seasons of football to do so.



Super Bowl crown

Clippers score 19 points in final 5:42 to win first title since 1976

NEWBURYPORT — As dusk descended and the Newburyport High football team gathered at midfield,

"Nobody works any harder!" he shouted. It was a fitting summation of the Clippers' stirring come-from-behind 27-12 Super Bowl win against previously undefeated South Shore League champion East Fridgewater Saturday afternoon at windswept World War Memorial Stadium.

After falling behind, 12-8, early in the fourth period, the Clippers packed 19 points into the game's final 5:42 to claim their first Super Bowl crown since 1976 and third postseason title in five appearances dating back to 1975.

We stress to the kids that if they play the whole game, good things will happen and they did today," said beaming Newburyport coach Ed Gaudiano after the Cape Ann League champs wrapped up a 10-1 season and joined the 1896, 1975 and 1976 squads as the only NHS teams to win 10 or more. games.

'I don't think people respected us. Even in the Cape Ann League there was talk we didn't belong in this game. I guess we proved today who the best team was," Gaudiano

With East Bridgewater's vaunted defense sive line allowed the Clippers to unleash their diverse weapons in a well-conceived attack that kept the Vikings guessing and off balance.

Senior quarterback Steve Ladd completed 14-of-19 passes for 135 yards and two TDs. enior flanker Mike Ladd (175 all-purpose ýards, 2 TDs) averaged 10.3 yards each time he touched the ball. Senior tightend Chris Hale caught three passes, scored a TD and laid on some punishing downfield blocks. And all Bashaw did was rush for 84 yards

"If you key on Bashaw, we're going to get you other ways. Brett is our All-Scholastic but I've said all year that without Mike, Steve and Chris we're not where we are. Without them, we don't go as far as we did,' said Gaudiano.

"Ed did a nice job and his kids played great. I thought we did a great job containing Bashaw, but you just can't tell how good kids are and team speed on film," said East Bridgewater coach Ron St. George following his club's third straight Super Bowl loss.

"This 25 (Mike Ladd) really hurt us and they hurt us with the pass. Bashaw had the big name coming in, but 46 (Hale) and 25 did us in offensively and the quarterback did a nice job as well," he said.









Seawall defense

If a single phrase describes the Newburyport High football team's defense this season, "separate and swarm" would be it.

Throughout the season, opposing teams have stubbornly attempted to run the ball against Newburyport. With one exception, those offenses have broken apart against the Clippers' Seawall Defense.

The reason?

Abundant team speed has allowed the Clippers to separate themselves from blocks and swarm to the ball in waves. It has not been uncommon for opposing ball carriers to elude one, perhaps two tacklers only to find themselves buried under four or five more onrushing Clippers.

And, make no mistake — the defense

has carried this team to at least a share of an eighth Cape Ann League championship and the brink of a fifth Super Bowl appearance.

"There is no substitute for team speed and we can run — it's the quickest group we've had," said head coach Ed Gaudiano. "We're able to chase things down, which

is very frustrating to an offense.

"The big guys up front are real quick in a 10-yard square. As a group, I don't know anyone who's faster than our ends and linebackers. And, the secondary is quick and tackles well," he said.

This season's performance hearkens back to the glory days of the 1960s and 1970s when "Kolman's Krushers" — named for long-time assistant and defensive mastermind Paul Kolman — manhandled foes, first in the Northeastern Conference and later in the CAL.

The architect these days is assistant coach Bob Clarke, whose defenses have consistently ranked among the league's best.

"In terms of team play and team concept, they're the best group we've had. They might not be the best group of athletes we've had, but it's the best defense because they are unselfish kids who work hard and are coachable. They're all good football kids," said Clarke.

The numbers paint a clear picture of the dominance of this unit.

In fashioning five shutouts, the Clippers have allowed just six touchdowns and 43 points; yielded the fewest yards rushing (804) since 1983 (777); given up the fewest total yards (1,261) since 1984 (1,465); and forced the highest number of turnovers (29) since 1984 (29).

In each of its eight wins, Newburyport held opponents to less than 100 yards

rushing. High-powered offenses such as Ipswich (84 yards), Triton (80) and North Andover (68) made little or no headway. Four opponents — including Triton (55 yards) and Ipswich (92 yards) — managed less than 100 yards of *net total* offense.

"There were some games we really did a good job smothering teams. Triton was a great effort — they had a lot of weapons and we were able to snuff out all of them." Ipswich was our hardest-hitting game and the defense kept us in against North Andover until we found a way to win," said Gaudiano.

"I would say Ipswich was the high point for me because they're always so tough and Jack (Welch) is such good football guy. You have to be very well-prepared for them and to shut them out was special," offered Clarke.

Jean joins UNH Hall of Fame

Emptying out the notebook:

The ceremony came and went without much fanfare, but former Newburyport High quarterback Bob Jean (NHS, '84) was inducted

into the University of New Hampshire's 100 Club Hall of Fame on Oct. 27.

Jean, a 1989 graduate, holds practically every UNH single-season and career passing record, including career yardage (7,742), completions (567) and TD pass-

During his tenure, the Wildcats compiled a 26-16 record and he was both a co-captain and team MVP as a senior. He won two Gold Helmets, was Yankee Conference Player of the Week several times and was selected Sports Illustrated Player of the Week once.

Jean was a 10th-round draft pick of the Cincinnati Bengals in 1989 and later played in both the World League and the U.S. Football League.

A three-sport standout at Newburyport, Jean put together a spectacular season when he guided the Clippers to a 7-3 mark in 1983, setting school single-season marks for completions (119), attempts (194) and yards (1,791) that still stand and don't seem in any immediate danger. In just 15 high school varsity starts, Jean completed 151-of-264 passes for 2,316 yards (2nd) and 21 TDs (3rd).

Four join NHS Wall of Fame

NEWBURYPORT — In ceremonies that began Wednesday and concluded during halftime of Thursday's football game against Amesbury, Vic Woron (class of '42), George "Bink" Bradbury (class of '48), Al Marshall (class of '54) and Eddie "Harry" O'Bara became the four newest members installed on the Newburyport High School Wall of Fame.

The new inductees had their plaques unveiled Wednesday morning before moving to Ten Center Street for the banquet where they each received commemorative certificates. Norm Doyle, who served as the Master of Cermonies, and Larry Gravelle chaired the event.

Woron won eight varsity letters in three sports. He was captain of the 1942 basketball team that captured the Class B State Championship and ranks 16th on the Clipper career scoring list with 552 points. He also captained the football team and scored on a blocked punt to give Newburyport a 7-0 win over Amesbury in 1941. Woron was a two-year starter as a catcher and hit .436 for the 1940 baseball team.

"Vic was probably one of the most outstanding athletes ever to contribute to NHS sports," said Bill Griffin, who outlined Woron's accomplishments at the banquet. "No matter what the competition was on the field, Vic wanted to be there."


Unable to attend due to recent minor surgery, Woron's award was accepted by his daughter Victoria.

Bradbury was a rare 12-letterman as well as the 1948 class president and Ryan Cup winner. He was a football cocaptain and two-way starter who accumulated 67 points over his career. In the spring he was the baseball catcher and also competed in several track events.

"I find myself in awe of the previous selections to the Wall and I consider it an honor and privlege to be included with them," said Bradbury, who was introduced by his long-time friend Bill Sullivan.

Marshall was a baseball and football standout who is still considered by many as the best catcher in NHS history. He hit better than .450 in the final two seasons and went on to sign a professional contract with the Baltimore Orioles organization. He reached the Triple-A level before a hand injury forced his retirement from the game.

On the football field he played fullback and defensive tackle and was an outstanding place kicker (32 PATs). He finished his career with 80 total points.

"You name it, he could do it," said Walter Sheridan, who coached Marshall in football and baseball. "He was the best I ever saw at throwing down to second and catching pop flies. He had all the defensive skills. And with the bat, it was always a comfortable feeling with Al coming up. In football, I had the opportunity to teach him. In baseball, I learned from him."

"My brother Dick passed away earlier this year and I'd like to, in my own way, share this honor with him," said Marshall in accepting the award.

O'Bara was a two-sport captain who starred in football and baseball. He holds the record for the longest TD run from scrimmage (93 yards versus Stoneham), is third on the all-time scoring list with 193 points and sixth in all-time rushing with 1,663 yards. As a senior he rushed for 1,034 yards and scored 105 points to earn all-Class B honors.

He was a four-year starter at shortstop and the only freshman football player to dress on Thanksgiving Day in Jim Stehlin's 20-year coaching career at NHS.

"He just made things happen," said Stehlin, of O'Bara. "He always had the ability to make the big play."

"On Eddie's plaque it says 'Scatback from Joppa. Relied on quickness, balance and heart more than size and speed'." he continued "What I think that

means is you don't have to coach guys like Eddie O'Bara. You just showcase them, put them in the best situation. He was never injured, never missed a practice and never gave you a bit of trouble. All he gave you was 110 percent."

Defending champion Clippers will battle youth

There is no avoiding it — this year's Newburyport High varsity football team is young.

While recognizing that replacing 14 seniors -

many of them two-way starters for at least two years — from a 10-1 championship team is a seemingly daunting task, coach Ed Gaudiano (9th year, 55-28-0,

.663 pct.) has been patiently preparing the defending Cape Ann League and EMass. Div. 4B Super Bowl champions.

He has been here before.

After graduating 19 seniors from the 1993 CAL champions and Super Bowl finalists, the Clippers re-loaded in 1994 and fashioned a 7-3 campaign. But, with only seven seniors on this year's roster, Gaudiano knows duplicating that pattern could be difficult.

"It's a different situation. This team is a lot younger (than '94). We have to build football sense and a lot of guys are going to have to grow up fast. Still, it's been a good pre-season in terms of looking at different combinations and different kids in different spots," said Gaudiano, whose clubs have compiled a 26-6 slate the past three seasons — the program's best run since the powerhouse teams of the mid-1970s.

A handful of starters return in key positions and should provide Gaudiano and his staff a solid foundation to build on.

"We have a good core group and all them played a lot for us last year. Plus, we had a freshman stepup day last year so a lot of the kids who are now sophomores were with us for Thanksgiving Day and the Super Bowl and were around all the excitement. We're hoping for some carryover effect," he said.

Senior captain and three-year starter Pat McCormick (6-2, 230) figures to be one of the CAL's premier two-way linemen, holding down a tackle spot on each side of the ball.

Versatile senior Jed Beauparlant (5-10, 180)

emerged as a solid linebacker last year and moves in at fullback this season.

Senior safety/split end Steve Markos (6-0, 170) proved himself to be a gritty two-way player last fall and can also play quarterback if the need aris-

Junior Steve Lapham (6-0, 190) — who accounted for more than 300 all-purpose yards as a sophomore — figures to inherit the role as the Clippers' feature back from 1995's CAL and EMass. Div. 4 Player of the Year Brett Bashaw. On defense, Lapham shifts from end to linebacker.

Junior Ryan McCarthy (5-10, 160) is the heir apparent to graduated quarterback Steve Ladd and is likely to hold down a spot in the secondary as well.

Senior Luke Teel (6-0, 190), juniors Chris Brule (6-1, 200), Matt Coffe (6-2, 210) and Tom Welch (6-0, 230) and sophomores Pat Flynn (6-0, 185) and Bill Crowe (6-1, 200) are among the top candidates vying for time in the offensive and defensive lines.

Senior Tyler Russell (6-0, 180) returns to the program after a year off and could pull duty at defensive end while sharing time at tight end with junior Joe Picone (6-1, 185).

Senior Brendan McEvoy (5-8, 155), junior Matt Twomey (6-0, 165) and sophomores Jamie Armstrong (6-0, 170) and Frank Demand (5-7, 145) are in the running for backfield spots. The offense was dealt a blow when promising junior John Farrell was lost for the season after suffering a broken leg and dislocated ankle in a scrimmage against Whit-

Sophomore defensive end Jeff Stone (5-11, 170) and sophomore cornerbacks Armstrong and Mike Smolski (5-10, 155) have all had strong camps.

Gaudiano knows that approaching the prowess of last year's team, which averaged 21 points per game and pitched six shutouts, will be difficult.

"Patience is the key. We have football players but, for a lot of them, it's going to be a matter of adjusting to the varsity tempo," he said.

The Clippers close their pre-season schedule tonight with a controlled game scrimmage against Winthrop at World War Memorial Stadium (7).






Newburyport quarterback Ryan McCarthy scrambles away from pressure before completing a pass to Kevin Hale in the second period of last night's game












Four join NHS Wall of Fame

NEWBURYPORT — Four men who made major contributions to Newburyport High School athletics over a period of more than 35 years joined the school's Wall of Fame during last night's induction dinner at The Crimson Coach House.

The addition of Don Zabriskie (Class of '42), Jack Foley ('57), Paul Shepard ('65) and Kevin Sullivan ('76) brings to 33 the number of former athletes, coaches and administrators honored since the Wall of Fame was established in 1982.

Prior to dinner, the inductees' plaques were unveiled during a brief ceremony at World War Memorial Stadium. Each will be introduced at halftime of tonight's varsity football game against Triton.

"Many of the 33 [Wall of Fame] recipients are here. All of you share a common bond, a place of honor and recognition. You all have an esteemed place in this community," said Superintendent of Schools Paul Dulac in his opening remarks.

Wall of Fame Committee president Norm Doyle welcomed the crowd of approximately 125 family members, friends and former teammates and thanked them for their support.

Zabriskie was a starting forward on three Northeastern Conference championship basketball teams. As a senior, he was an All-Scholastic selection and captain of the 1942 Class B State championship team — the only State basketball title in school history. Zabriskie led the NEC in scoring as a junior and finished with 417 career points. He was a three-year starter in center field on the baseball team and two-year starter at quarterback in football.

Zabriskie was presented by his son, Don Jr., who related that after earning a bronze star while serving in the Marine Corps during World War Two, his father began his coaching and teaching career at Amesbury High School.

Zabriskie then came to NHS where he taught science and coached basketball from 1958-66; served as high school principal from 1966-76; and was Director of Federal Programs for the school system from 1976-87.

"It's a great honor to be here this evening. When I look at the Wall and see the outstanding educators, administrators, coaches and athletes who are honored, it's just a great feeling," said Zabriskie, who added personal memories of his fellow inductees.

Foley, a four-year starter in football, was the feature running back on Newburyport's back-to-back State Class C championship teams of 1955-56 and was captain of the '56 squad. Despite missing most of his sophomore year with a leg injury, Foley still ranks fourth on the school's all-time scoring list with 165 points.

One of the premier sprinters in the State, Foley also excelled in track, specializing in the 880 and relays. As a senior, he earned letters in both track and baseball during the spring.

Wall of Fame coach Walt Sheri-

dan presented Foley.

"I coached 15 years and Jack Foley was the best offensive and defensive player I ever had. He was the fastest, strongest back I ever coached. He didn't run around you — he went over you or through you. He could do more things from two formations (T and Single Wing) than any boy I ever coached," said Sheridan.

Foley paid emotional tribute to his former teammates, in particular co-captain and linebacker Luther

Reed.

"High school athletics was a time of magic for me and a lot of fun. I was lucky to be in the right place at the right time with a great coaching staff and a lot of natural athletes. We were always prepared and knew we could perform. The comradeship was real and great to be around. Thanks for the memories," he said.

Shepard still holds numerous school and Northeastern Conference records. In only 32 varsity games, he scored 856 points (5th alltime) and set school records for single-season average (30.4 ppg), career average (27.6 ppg) and points in a game (60) while winning back-to-back NEC scoring titles. Shepard was also a two-way end in football and ran track. He was presented by Wall of Fame coach and Athletic Director Jim Stehlin.

"I came to Newburyport in 1964, Paul's senior year. I was there 30 years, including 24 as an AD, so I saw a lot of basketball. I want to tell you that nobody — nobody — dominated games like he did. He was amazing to watch," said Stehlin.

"But I'll tell you the type of person

he is. Every yearbook has a statement under the student's picture. Paul's was: 'He who humbles himself will be exalted.' He's been very successful but he's still the same person he was 30 years ago," he added.

Shepard was coached by fellow inductee Zabriskie.

"I'm very excited to be here. I've been fortunate to receive a lot of awards but this is the best I've received athletically by far," said Shenard

"I have to thank coach Zabriskie for his leadership and for allowing me to shoot so much. And, I have to aplogize to my teammates for shooting so much — without their help, none of this would have happened. I'll always be indebted to coach Stehlin for the positive influence he had on my life. And I have to thank my mom for the encouragement, commitment and unconditional loyalty she has always shown," he said.

Sullivan was team MVP and an all-Cape Ann League pick in football, baseball and basketball while earning nine varsity letters. An All-Scholastic quarterback, he led the Clippers to 19 straight wins and guided the undefeated 1975 team (11-0) to the school's first Super Bowl championship. He was the center fielder on three straight CAL championship baseball teams, had a career average of .354 and had a team-high 37 hits for the 1976 EMass. Div. 2 championship team which advanced to the only State baseball title game in school history. As a basketball guard, he scored 407 career points.

"Over the years, I was gifted with many great quarterbacks. Kevin was a great option quarterback and a great leader on a great team. We never played him much on defense but he showed what kind of athlete he was when he went on to start as a defensive back at UMass on perhaps their best teams in the modern era," said Stehlin.

Sullivan spoke of the tradition of NHS athletics.

"When I see the plaques on that wall and realize you're going up there, it's a great feeling," said Sullivan. "I've always loved the Clipper colors, the stadium, the tunnel and those gold helmets. From the time I was eight years old, I knew I wanted

to come out of that tunnel on a Friday night and wear that gold helmet.

"In football, we learned that if you're going to wave your finger No. One, then you better be able to do the job on the field. We learned to play with class for Coach Stehlin. In baseball, Coach [Bill] Pettingell taught us all the finer points of the game. I never knew there was so much to learn but he made us all love the game. Both coaches helped make us champions," said Sullivan.

Sullivan thanked his older brother Mike, a 1968 NHS grad and former-quarterback "who always let me tag along and taught me a lot"; his parents because "they never pushed meand the only thing they asked was that I act like a gentleman"; his wife Ellen "for her support and motivation ever since high school"; and allof his former teammates because "it was very rewarding to be a member of a great class with successful people on and off the field."

At the conclusion of the evening, each inductee was presented with a personalized history of their career compiled by Wall of Fame historian Bert Spofford.

Ipswich's Welch ready, set for No. 33

ery few people can say they've been doing the same job for 33 years, but then very few people are Jack Welch, patriarch and head coach of Ipswich football.

Welch has been the head coach of the Tigers since the beginning of the Johnson administration and he shows no signs of slowing down. After three Super Bowl

titles, two Class D state titles and nine Cape Ann League championships, he wants more.

"This is the smallest school in the league, but we have a good system going," said Welch, who has the second-longest tenure with one team in EMass history. "We have great kids and great parents here in Ipswich. They know football, and this is a great football town."

Welch, 63, started at Ipswich in 1964, after coaching the junior varsity at Newburyport for four years. If all goes well for Welch and his Tigers, he could get his 200th victory Oct. 5 at home against Newburyport, where he still lives.

Welch has noticed some differences since he started, especially in the players, and he is not hesitant to describe them.

"There are not as many players willing to pay the price," said Welch. "There are just no more of that type of kid. Many of these kids have both parents working, and they give their kids a lot more than kids got before.

"When I started coaching, most of the kids dug clams over the summer to make money, so they were in shape when they came back for practice. They didn't have to lift weights to get in shape for the start of the season."

One problem he doesn't have at Ipswich is parental interference. At many schools, he said, he has seen coaches pressured by parents to play their kids, and at the same time, win games.

"This is especially a problem for younger coaches at the varsity level," Welch said. "This is one reason some younger coaches don't seem to last as long. They have pressure to win, but they may not be able to do that if they have to play everybody."

Welch was given a department-head job at Ipswich in the early 1970s, and with enthusiastic support, he does not know when he will retire.

"I am comfortable in this area. I like the area, and it is just

about an 11-mile commute from Newburyport to the school," said Welch.

Welch tries to remember everybody he has coached and taught. There have been hundreds of players, and thousands of students.

"I remember the less-talented players as much as the stars, because they got as much, if not more, out of the game than the players for whom the game came easily," said Welch.

"I have the greatest respect for kids who play football. It is a

difficult sport to play the right way." Some teams, he said, "just did not get it," but those teams have been few. He is demanding of his players, but he tries to give as much as he asks for.

In his first eight years of coaching, before the Super Bowl system, Welch won two Class D state titles and compiled a record of 54-14-2. He had two perfect seasons – 1968 and 1970. Welch won his first Super Bowl, in Division 3, in 1977. He then won the Division 4B championship in 1991 and 1992. His teams won the three title games by a combined score of 127-60, and he has a career record of 196-111-6 (.636 winning percentage).

Welch's presence gives a sense of stability to the team. He has been running the same offense, the Delaware Wing-T, since he started, and the same defense. Players coming from the junior varsity know what to expect when they step up to the varsity. His run at Ipswich is second longest to Ed Murphy, who coached at Dracut High from the end of World War II until 1990.

"I am a disciplinarian, but I hope I'm fair. I don't have many rules, but I want the players to obey them," he said. "I want the players to respect me, and to play football the way it should be played. I demand and try to get the most out of kids."

Welch's Tigers have had a couple of down periods; in the late seventies and the late eighties. From 1978-80, his record was 12-16-2, and from 1987-89, it was 5-25. However, those were merely dips to be expected when you coach as long as Welch. The team rebounded with the back-to-back Super Bowl titles, and the Tigers had an 8-2 record last year.

This year, Welch hopes to contend again, with Newburyport the team to beat. His only concern is that the 1996 team may


not have as much experience as others. However, its coach has more than enough for everybody.

on the iob Port endured year of learning

The Newburyport High football team learned one indisputable tenet of sport this fall — there is no substitute for game experience.

The lack of it proved to be the major obstacle in the transition from 1995's senior-laden Cape Ann League and Super Bowl champi-

onship squad to this season's 4-6 club.

In a campaign alternately sprinkled with hardfought wins and disappointing defeats, the Clippers were generally unable to overcome the self-inflicted damage of untimely turnovers and penalties.

That was especially apparent on offense. Despite averaging nearly 210 yards and 11 first downs per game and five yards per rushing attempt, the Clippers scored just 8.9 points an outing and had season-long difficulty finishing off in the scoring zone.

"We made a lot of mistakes and, to us, they were big. That was where we were still young. We weren't able to get by where and when the mistakes happened. Football isn't a game of stats. You have to be able to translate [stats] into wins and that means making things pay off inside the 20. That's just learning the game," said coach Ed Gaudiano (9th year, 59-34-0).

"We went out there to win every game and there are some we'd certainly like to have back. Still, we made a good dent into the future. The strength of the team

was in the underclassmen. They got some good experience," he said.

While the problems weren't as apparent defensively, with as many as five sophomores and a freshman often on the field at the same time, the Clippers were occasionally physically overmatched.

That was reflected in the opposition's ability to average more than six yards per rushing play while averaging nearly 20 points per game. For the season, the Clippers had only 13 takeaways and managed a meager five quarterback sacks.

"They were playing a lot of downs. It got to the point towards the end where we were trying things with personnel with people in different positions, trying to get the right person in the right spot at the right times," said Gaudiano.

"We had some guys out there who had never been at varsity speed and had never tackled a varsity back. Still, a lot of guys stepped up. All the sophomores and [freshman Kevin] Hale were put into a very difficult situation. It was a hard jump, but they handled it well," he said.

Gaudiano credited the resiliency of the senior class led by captain and all-league tackle Pat McCormick and fullback/linebacker Jed Beauparlant — and said they were placed in a tough spot.

"It was a tough spot because all of them had been used to wining. It was a tough spot because there were so few of them and they had to see a team concentrated around underclassmen. But, they hung in there,'

said Gaudiano.

"Pat gave us good lea dership all season and Jed stepped up and had a very good year as a two-way player. As a group, they picked themselves up and gave it what they had every game," said Gaudiano, also citing the contributions of seniors Marco Hodges, Steve Markos, Brendan McEvoy, Luke Teel, Tyler Russell and Brazilian exchange student Pedro Dreux.

After a season-opening 29-0 loss to Wilmington, the Clippers bounced back with a solid 15-12 win against Pentucket. Frustrating losses to Ipswich and Masconomet followed before the Clippers scratched out a tough 8-7 win against Hamilton-Wenham.

The Clippers fell to rival Triton, 14-7, despite controlling play for the majority of the game then responded with a crisp 22-14 upset of a solid Lynnfield club. Lopsided losses to league champion North Andover and archrival Amesbury sandwiched the Clippers' fourth win, a 19-6 decision of North Read-

"The Lynnfield win was just a real good effort against a pretty good team that, on paper, was probably better than us. The kids listened to us and were rewarded. And, the win against Hamilton-Wenham was a confidence-builder at that point in the season," said Gaudiano.

"On the other hand, Triton was a game I thought we controlled, had our opportunities and lost. We worked our butts off and didn't get a thing out of it. Amesbury was just a disappointing way to end it. I never would've thought that would happen in a million years. That wasn't us who showed up and was not indicative of the way we played everyone else all year," he said.

A stable of hard-running backs were the Clippers' offensive main-

Junior Steve Lapham (674 yards rushing; 1,052 all-purpose yards), the senior Beauparlant (427 yards rushing) and sophomore Jamie Armstrong (350 yards rushing) accounted for 1,451 rushing yards, nine TDs and 2,117 all-purpose yards. Junior Ryan McCarthy grew increasingly comfortable at quarterback, completing 46.6 percent of his passes (41-of-88, 399 yards) while throwing two TDs and just five interceptions.

"The numbers were pretty good. The problem was we stopped ourselves as much as other teams stopped us. Those were the frustrating things but also are things that can be coached out," Gaudiano said.

Defensively, the senior linebacking tandem of Beauparlant and Russell played well. McCormick and Lapham were steady at the ends and the secondary of sophomores Mike Smolski, Jeff Wecal and Jeff Stone and the freshman Hale showed plenty of ability.

"We have enough players back wit experience, including a lot of linemen. Each kid has to come back bigger, stronger and faster. Ultimately, our goal is to get the best 11 guys on the field — it doesn't matter what grade they're in," Gaudiano concluded.
