PROSPECTS FOR FOOTBALL.

High School Aspirants Out for Places on the Team.

The football season has opened and Capt. Hamilton of the local school has about 30 candidates from which to pick his team. The men who are trying for position on the team practice every afternoon and before the league games begin the Newburyports will have as strong and snappy a team as any in the league.

The men are being coached by Capt. Shepard of last year's team. Shepard, Johnson, Parton, W. Brown, Rogers, Pettengill and Miller will be missed from the team this season, but their places will be filled by competent men. Last year a great many men did not try for the team because they thought that there was no possible show of making it, but this year a great many of these men have come out and are trying for different positions on the team.

Only four men that played on last year's team will be seen on the field this season. Twelve new men are practicing daily for a place on the team. All of these men have played football before to some extent. Every man stands a chance of getting a position on the team if he will only come out and practice, because a large number of substitutes will be wanted this season.

Newburyport's first league game is with Wakefield two weeks from Saturday in Wakefield. The men are improving every day and by the first of next month will be in fine shape to meet any of the league teams.

Salem plays here the first of November and if it wants to win it will have to work hard because Newburyport would rather beat Salem than any other team in the league.

All the cups put up to be contested for by the different teams in the league have come to Newburyport and it is hoped that the football cup will come here also. Salem has not had a smell in any of these races except the ice polo, which was between them and Newburyport, there being no ice.

PLAYED DUMMER TO A TIE.

New High School Football Team Shows Up In Practice Game.

Colby Has Not Lost Knaek of Getting Around the End.

The Line Put Up Good Front Against the Bucking of Dummer.

The Newburyport High School football team played its first scheduled game of the season yesterday at Hyfield, the opposing team being their old antagonists, the Dummers.

Several new men were tried on the High School team and their work was watched with great interest by the supporters of the team, but they acquitted themselves very favorably.

Every man played with a determination to win and they deserve great credit for the firm way in which they held their larger opponents. The team gives every prospect of being as good, if not superior, to the team of '96.

The Dummers presented a team composed of older, stronger and heavier players than the High Schools, but what the Newburyport boys lacked in strength they made up in pluck and activity.

The score resulted in a tie and this fact alone in a football game is enough to prove that the game was exciting and hotly contested.

The boys in the High School line did excellent work and to them belongs the credit of holding the score down, for as the Dummers confined themselves exclusively to bucking the line they received the brunt of the work.

Colby, aided by the fine interference of Smith, Hamilton and Greenleaf, made a brilliant run of 80 yards, scoring a touchdown.

Rollins, a quarter tackled good but was a trifle slow in passing and giving signal. He will improve with time.

H. Pike and W. Pike, guards, more than held their own. Hamilton rarely lost when he had the ball.

Smith and Blake on the ends made a good showing, each making several good tackles.

For Dummer the backs did most of the work. Myers and Wilder are both good ground gainers, while Woodbury excels at line bucking.

The tackling of Sprague was a feature of the game.

The game started at 3.45. Dummer won the toss and took the choice of goals, giving the High Schools the ball.

Dummer captured the ball on the kickoff and immediately began to attack the line. They made about 20 yards in this manner, when the Newburyport boys pulled themselves together and held them for four downs and got the ball.

Hamilton popped the ball through the centre for a yard. Colby then tucked the oval under his arm and settled himself down for an 80-yard run with the whole Dummer team after him. Result, touchdown from which Rollins kicked a goal. Score, 6 to 0 in favor of the High Schools.

Dummer, not to be outdone, fought desperately and when the Newburyport got the ball on the kickoff they were obliged to return it to the academy boys as they could make no gain. Myers and Wilder each worked the ball around the ends for a yard apiece.

Woodbury was then given the pigskin for a centre play and he slipped through the bunch and was over the line before the Newburyport boys knew who had the ball. He also kicked the goal, making the score a tie, 6 to 6. This ended the scoring for the afternoon. Dummer got the ball on the kickoff and by repeatedly banging away at the line made about 20 yards when time was called for the first half.

In the second half Newburyport got the ball on the kickoff. Colby tried left end for a small gain. Greenleaf then made a good run around right end for 20 yards. Here the ball went to Dummer on four downs. Woodbury and Myers made small gains through the line, then the High Schools held them and secured the ball on downs. Hamilton plugged the line and Colby tried the left end but neither gained an inch. Here one of the Dummer men were caught off side and Newburyport was given five yards. This brought the ball to Dummer's 25-yard line and there it staid to the end of the game, as neither side could make any gain. The ball went from one team to the other. The players pushed and struggled but in vain, each team had made a stand and refused to budge. Time was called while Dummer had the ball. The line up was as follows:

LAWRENCE TOOK THE GAME.

High School Football Players

Failed to Score Saturday.

Players Too Heavy for the Light Centre of Home Team.

Spectators Interfered with the Movements of the Players.

The football game Saturday afternoon between the Lawrence High and the Newburyport High school football teams resulted in a victory for the up-river team, the game being hotly contested from start to finish.

There were many spectators present and they greatly interfered with the movements of the players by crowding on the field giving them scarcely room enough to move about.

The failure of the Newburyport boys to score was due to their fumbling the ball at critical stages of the game, the passing of the ball by the backs being wretched.

Among the players in the Lawrence line-up was Grey, the old varsity player, who is at present instructor in the Manual Training school at Lawrence, but who played centre on the Colby University '93 and '94 foot ball teams.

Grey was a tower of strength in the line and he distinguished himself by making several good tackles.

The Newburyports were greatly strengthened by W. Brown, who has returned to school and will play with the team for the remainder of the season. His run of 40 yards was a feature of the game.

Pike put up a hot game at right guard breaking through several times and tackling behind the line. Smith and Rollins were tackled good.

For Lawrence Whalen and Thompson did the best work. The line bucking by Whalen being of a high order.

Notwithstanding the fact that the Lawrence players greatly outweighed the local boys the teams were very evenly matched being anybody's game up to the finish.

The game started at 2.30 o'clock. Newburyport won the toss and took the choice of goals giving Lawrence the ball.

Newburyport got the ball on the kickoff and lost ground on their first play by a fumble. Greenleaf made two yards around right end. W. Brown one yard around left end and Hamilton went through the centre for another one. Greenleaf tried right end again and made 2 yards. Hamilton tried the centre with no gain. On the next two plays the Newburyport boys fumbled and the ball went to Lawrence on downs.

Whalen pushed the ball five yards through right guard and centre and Thompson carried it five more around right end. The ball was again passed to Thomp-

son for an end play but Rollins broke through the interference, made a splendid tackle, Lawrence losing a yard. On the next play Greenleaf captured the ball on a fumble. The Newburyports pulled themselves together and by good playing forced the ball twenty yards down the field on end plays, then followed some more juggling, the result of which, was the ball went to Lawrence on downs.

Whalen bucked the line for two yards. As the ball was snapped back for the next play H. Pike broke through the line and tackled the man with the ball causing the Lawrence boys to lose five yards and forcing them to punt.

On the next line-up W. Brown went around left end for 40 yards and the prospect of a touchdown was very bright but the boy's spoiled their chance by more fumbling and the ball went back to Lawrence.

Here both teams huddled down and played hard but neither side could gain their distance. The ball swapped hands several times and the first half closed without either side scoring.

In the second half Lawrence got the ball on the kickoff and started to mow down the Newburyport line but the Newburyport line stubbornly refused to be mowed down and Whalen dropped back for a punt. Hamilton caught the ball, but one of the Lawrence players kicked it out of his hands and fell on it. The referee decided it was Lawrence's ball.

The Lawrence boys put forth all their energy into their work and in a short time had pushed the ball down to within five yards of the Newburyport goal line.

Thompson was then given the ball and he was pushed over the line but the touchdown was not allowed as Umpire Shepard decided that both teams had lined up off side, so the ball was put back five yards from the goal line.

Wilson then took the ball and went over the line for a touchdown from which Stratton kicked a difficult goal. Score 6 to 0 in favor of Lawrence. This ended the scoring.

Lawrence got the ball on the kickoff and Thompson went through right guard and tackle for three yards. On the next play Howard Pike broke through the line and stole the ball. The Newburyports regained ten yards by W. Brown making an end play and were given four yards more on an offside play. This landed them within four yards of the enemy's goal and had it not been for the crowd pressing on the field they would have scored. As they had no room for an end play they had to buck the line with the result that Lawrence got the ball on downs. Whalen then punted it out of danger.

The Lawrence boys then delayed the game by playing for win, and in a short time the time keeper's whistle blew leaving them the victors, the score standing 6 to 0. The line-up was as follows:

A KICK AT THE FINISH.

Haverhill Football Players Left Field in a Huff Yesterday.

Referee Had Repeatedly Warned Them Against Slugging.

Gave a Decision to Newburyport and Up-River Men Angered.

The Newburyport High School football team played its second home game of the season with Haverhill High School yesterday afternoon, and in the last part of the last half the referee gave the game to Newburyport on a forfeit.

Haverhill's right tackle was warned twice for slugging, and Lee was warned for being off side. The ball was in Haverhill's possession at this time, and the ball was given to Newburyport with the ball on Haverhill's 30-yard line. Here the game ended with the score a tie, 6 to 6.

In the first half O'Connor kicked off, and Colby caught it, and made a small gain. After about five minutes play with the ball on Haverhill's 5-yard line, Colby worked the centre, and scored a touchdown. Rollins kicked the goal.

O'Connor kicked off and the ball was caught by Rollins, but he failed to make any gain. Brown and Colby worked the ends for steady gain. With the ball on Haverhill's 5-yard line, Wildes broke through left guard, took the ball from Rollins' extended hands and made a pretty run of the whole length of the field and scored a touchdown, from which he kicked a goal.

Rollins kicked off. The ball was caught by Tuck, who made a small gain. Here Haverhill was given 10 yards on account of

Pope being off side. Wildes punted and Evans caught it and made a good gain. Newburyport here received the ball on an off-side play.

Colby and Brown made good gains and time was called with the ball in the centre of the field. Score: N. H. S., 6; H. H. S., 6.

In the second half Rollins kicked off and the ball was caught by Smith and advanced five yards. The Newburyports then held them for four downs. With the ball on Haverhill's 30-yard line, the up-river boys left the field, because they said that the referee roasted them by giving the ball to Newburyport on account of slugging and for being off side. The rules say that 25 yards shall be given for intentional slugging and this would have brought the ball on to Haverhill's 5-yard line, but instead he gave the ball to Newburyport on Haverhill's 30-yard line.

HAD MASCOT WITH THEM.

High School Football Team Played Dummer 16 to 0 Saturday.

All the Scoring Done in the Second Half of the Game.

Amesbury Defeated Merrimac Before a Big Crowd, 18 to 0.

At Byfield Saturday afternoon the Newburyport High School defeated the Dummer Academy football team by a score of 16 to 0. All of the scoring was done in the second half, both teams putting up a very even game during the first half of the contest.

The Newburyports carried over with them as a mascot, Johnnie Ricks, a smart colored boy, who was dressed in old clothes and crimson and gold ribbons. He carried a banner on which was printed, "I'm John Ricks, mascot for N. H. S." On the other side was, "Here we see Dummer Finished."

In opening Rollins kicked off and the ball was caught by Horne. They soon lost on downs.

The Newburyports soon lost the ball on downs, it being on Dummer's 10 yard line.

Wilder made a good 10 yard gain around right end, and their heavy backs kept bucking the line until time was called with the ball on N. H. S. 4 one-half line. Had the time not have been up at this point, the Dummer boys would no doubt have pushed it over the line on the next play. No scoring was done until the second half.

In the second half Kelley caught the ball on the kick off and made a five yard gain. On the next play Brown took the ball around left end running the whole length of the field and scored a touchdown from which Rollins kicked a goal.

Colby caught the ball on the kick off and made a good five yard gain. Brown tried again to repeat his last play, but slipped and was soon landed on. Nevertheless, repeated gains by Brown and Colby, soon brought the ball on Dummer's two yard line. From here Brown took it over for another touchdown and Rollins kicked a goal.

Kelley caught the ball on the kick off and advanced it 10 yards, but it was lost on a fumble. The ball was soon returned to Newburyport, Dummer losing it on downs. Colby and Brown made good gains through the line and around the ends and the ball was carried over the line again by Colby. Rollins failed to kick a goal this time.

SHUT OUT AMESBURY.

Newburyport High Schools Took
Another Good Game Saturday.

Lighter Weight Counted Against
the Beef of Their Opponents.

Every Yard of the Game Had to be
Bitterly Contested For.

The Newburyport High Schools defeated the Amesbury V. M. C. A. foot ball team Saturday afternoon by a score of 18 to 0. It was by far the cleanest and most interesting game played in this city this season.

Notwithstanding the size of the score, the local team had no walkover by any means. Every yard gained had to be desperately fought for.

The quality of the Amesbury team to score was due to their utter lack of team work, the backs in particular having no interference. Quite a delegation of rooters accompanied the up-river team but their cheers to root were few and far between. (Great credit should be given to the Amesbury boys for the gentlemanly manner in which they conducted themselves throughout the game.)

The hard feeling and rowdiness that generally crops out when Newburyport and Amesbury meet on the gridiron was conspicuously absent.

As usual the High Schools were outwitted by the opposing team making it necessary for them to handle themselves to end plays as they could not budge the Amesbury line.

W. Brown and Colby with the aid of good interference did the bulk of the ground gaining for the Newburyports. Their fast running around the ends, called forth the

cheers of the spectators time and time again. T. Brown, Rollins and Little Moore Brown did great work in the interference. The playing of the latter at right was of high order.

Rollins, whose work at quarter early in the season was very poor has braced up wonderfully. He passed the ball and tackled well. Pike at guard played good and broke through often. Kelley clearly proved that his position is tackle instead of back of the line.

PLAYED TO A STANDSTILL.

Hot Football Game Between the Salem and Local High Schools.

The Score Was 10 to 10 After a Most Exciting Contest.

Hard Work of the Players to Wrest Victory for Their Eleven.

The Newburyport High and the Salem High school football teams met at the North End grounds Saturday afternoon, and played to a standstill. The game resulted in a tie each side scoring ten points.

It was by far the most exciting game seen in this city this season. The Salem team was accompanied by about 125 rooters, who came down armed with megaphones and rubber lungs, to teach the Newburyport boys a few things about rooting. It is needless to say that they accomplished their purpose. The local boys were rooted right off their feet.

The Salem players made an imposing sight when they appeared on the field being the heaviest team that the local players have lined up against this year.

H. Roberts the 230 pound guard, was looked upon to do great things, but he was not "quite so much" when Howard Pike got through with him.

It would be doing the Newburyport boys injustice to attempt to say who played best on the home team. They all played together and no one shirked his duty. Great credit should be given to W. Pike, Townsend, and H. Pike for the excellent manner in which they filled their respective positions. W. Brown and Colby did most of the running with the ball, Hamilton doing good work in the interference. Rollins managed to get in some of his nailing tackles and Smith and Buckley, ends, were found in every play.

For Salem the backs did most of the work. Capt. Wade rarely failed to make his distance through the line, while the running of Mulligan and McGlew was of high order. Driscoll managed the team like a veteran.

Game started at 2:20. Salem won the toss and took the choice of goals. Rollins kicked off and Driscoll caught the ball advancing it fifteen yards before Colby, Salem steadily pushed the Newburyport boys back until they had the ball shoved over for a touchdown. Goodhue kicked an easy goal. Score 6 to 0 in favor of Salem. Time 5 minutes.

Wade captured the ball on the kick-off and with the help of good interference covered 20 yards. Mulligan then made three more around left end. On the next play McGlew started around right end but Hamilton broke through and tackled him causing Salem to lose three yards. Mulligan went around left end for five yards and Wade through centre for five more. McGlew tried the right end twice but only netted one yard.

Mulligan then started for left end but was dropped by H. Pike with a loss. Here Salem fumbled and lost ten yards and the pigskin, the ball being dropped on by Smith.

On the first play by the local boys they lost ground. W. Brown was then given the ball and he made seven yards around left end. On the next scrimmage one of the Salem players was caught offside and Newburyport was given ten yards. Colby dove through right tackle and end for ten yards, landing the ball on Salem's ten yard line. Another effort moved it to within three feet of the goal and then W. Brown went around left end for a touch-down. Rollins kicked an easy goal. Score 6 to 4 in favor of Newburyport.

Kelley caught the ball on the kick-off and by excellent dodging covered twenty-five yards when Wade tackled him, for, and Newburyport was given ten yards more.

The Newburyport boys were held for four downs and the ball changed hands. Salem by repeated hanging away at line forced the local team back yard by yard until finally Mulligan forged his way over the line for another touchdown, from which Goodhue kicked an easy goal. Score 10 to 6 in favor of Salem.

Shortly after Newburyport scored again W. Brown making a touchdown. Rollins missed the goal and the score which was 10 to 10 remained unchanged throughout the game. In the second half the boys were pretty well fagged out when they lined up, the efforts of the fast playing during the first half being plainly perceptible.

The Local Boys Lined Up Against a Much Heavier Team.

Amesbury's Dropped a Game to the Second Eleven in This City.

Newburyport played its first regular game in the challenge cup series Saturday afternoon at Gloucester and came home defeated by the score of 10 to 6.

The grounds were in poor condition for good football and this coupled with a wet ball necessitated some bad fumbling on both sides.

For Newburyport, Colby, Greenleaf, Brown, Pritchard and Greene played well while Sullivan, Pew, Sweet, Jeffrey and Andrews excelled for Gloucester.

The game was very cleanly played on both sides, a few questionable decisions by the referee being the only thing to mar the smoothness of the game.

Gloucester's average weight was more than that of Newburyport, and aided by this the Gloucester team used centre and tackle plays while the local high school relied on end runs and the old criss-cross trick to make substantial gains.

Gloucester won the toss and took the north goal. Greene kicked off to Jeffrey. Gloucester advanced the ball 40 yards when Newburyport held for downs. Colby made 20 yards on an end run and Smith ran very prettily 30 yards on a criss-cross around Gloucester's left end. HAD AN EASY THING.

Newburyport Defeated Portsmouth at Football, 56 to 0.

Visiting Team Unable to Make Any Resistance to Local Players.

Dammer Took a Game From the Lynn High by a Score of 16 to 0.

Newburyport High was altogether too speedy for the Portsmouth High on the gridiron Saturday afternoon, as the score 56 to 0 shows.

The gritty work of the home team was manifest in every period of the game and Portsmouth only once came anywhere near scoring.

Colby duplicated the drop kick for a goal accomplished by Hudson, the Carlisle Indian quarter back, in the game against Harvard, the same afternoon, only Colby's was from the 35 yard line, while the Indian's was at 20 yard.

It was the first goal from the field in the history of the Newburyport High and it caused no end of a sensation. It was done so perfectly and with such a dash that it took the visitors' breath away and fairly electrified the crowd.

The whole team played together finely and presented a perfect stone wall to their opponents, while the end plays and criss-cross was worked to perfection for the longest kind of runs, with none of the Portsmouth men sprinters enough to tackle. Some brilliant gains through the center were noticeable.

Colby, Rollins, Pritchard, Greene, Smith perhaps were leaders in the farce of the fight and won warm words of commendation from the older players.

For Portsmouth Tilley tackled well, but other than he there was no individual work, and besides the line had no stability that the Newburyport boys had any respect for.

"Any old play at all" was good for a gain of from 5 to 75 yards, and the visitors made only the semblance of a resistance. For a sloppy day and a wet field it was a great game.

The contest opened with Newburyport having the ball on the kick off. Two or three gains were made to warm up with and then Pritchard made a 20-yard run around the end. Portsmouth got the ball on a fumble but lost it on downs. Colby made a touchdown in 14 minutes, but Rollins slipped up on the kick for a goal. Score 5 to 0.

In the next Colby took the ball and made a slide of 15 yards with ease and again gained 10 yards. Pritchard tried a center play for a short gain. Rollins around the left scored the second touchdown in 54 minutes, landing the pluck in the corner. On a punt-out for position he lost and failed to land the ball on the kick from the center. Score 10 to 0.

Greene got the ball on the next kick off and Pritchard made a gain. Colby made repeated gains on end plays and Pritchard landed the ball for a goal in 3 minutes. Rollins kicked safely. Score, 15 to 0.

Greene took the ball and went forward about 25 yards. Colby got a ticket for a trip around the left end for 50 yards gain and the repeated advances of Pritchard,

Brown and Colby through holes in the Portsmouth line landed the ball down to their own 5 yard line. Brown popped through left center and was pushed over the line. Rollins failed to kick the goal. Score, 21 to 0.

Rollins missed the catch but a Newburyporter got the ball. Colby went forward 10 yards, Rollins 5 yards and Smith on a criss-cross a long run of 75 yards. Portsmouth put up a stiff fight and got the ball on downs, losing it on a bad fumble, Rickes falling on the ball. It was in this period that Colby made the drop kick and scored a goal from the field. Score, 28 to 0.

Brown and Rollins made gains around the left end and time was called with the ball on Newburyport's 20-yard line.

The men lined up for the second half. Fogg going in to take Reed's place.

Greene caught the ball and he, Pritchard and Rollins made continual gains. Pritchard made one of 30 yards and Colby on an end play scored in two minutes and Rollins successfully kicked the ball through the posts. Score 33 to 0.

Greene got the ball but lost to Portsmouth without a gain. Portsmouth put considerable vim into the play and made several small gains. Pritchard made 25 yards around their left end. Portsmouth was given the ball on an offside play but lost it on a fumble. Rollins made a big gain and Smith on a criss-cross made a long run down behind the line for a touchdown. Time 11-3 minutes. Score 38 to 0.

Colby on the kick-off ran down the line for 75 yards before he was tackled. Aid Rollins took wings on a criss-cross for 50 yards more and made a touchdown. Rollins kicked successfully. Score 44 to 0, 1-3 minutes play.

In the next period Smith ran 30 yards with the ball for a touchdown, while Rollins kicked a goal. Score 50 to 0.

It was in the succeeding period that Portsmouth made the longest gain in the game, Costello making 30 yards. Colby finally got possession and ran the whole length of the field for a touchdown without a semblance of an objection from the Portsmouth tackle. Rollins did the rest. Score 56 to 0.

Newburyport High school won from Lawrence High yesterday afternoon in the snappiest kind of a game ever seen on the football field in this city. The score was 12 to 6.

It will be remembered that our boys were defeated by the Lawrence eleven in that city 25 to 0, so the victory was hailed with great satisfaction.

The game yesterday was a most interesting exhibition and stubbornly fought. There was good team work on both sides. Newburyport had the lightest line by many pounds and most of their opponent's gains were made by pushing through the line.

Lawrence had some good backs but their attempts at end plays scarcely availed them anything.

Newburyport High made their end plays successfully and Colby, Pritchard, Smith and Rollins made some dashing plays that were pleasant to witness.

The other players put up a good quality of football. Medcalf and Kelley were new in the line and both gave a good account of themselves.

The game opened quite animatedly. Pritchard took the ball on Lawrence's kick-off and advanced to 45-yard line. He was put through the center for a good gain. Colby took another and Ed Rollins made 20 yards around the left end. Newburyport lost the ball twice on fumbles and Lawrence continually pushed the line for big gains.

Newburyport then got the ball on downs and Smith made 10 yards from the left end. The ball then went to Lawrence on a fumble and after bucking for short gains, went forward on an end play 15 yards.

Here was a pretty stubborn contest. Newburyport couldn't hold the line and C. E. Morrison was forced over for a touchdown and C. F. Morrison kicked a goal. Score, 6 to 0. Time 10 minutes.

C. F. Morrison took the ball on the kick-off but Newburyport put up a fierce resistance and very little was made. Lawrence moved forward on a series of center plays and then was so strongly opposed that the ball was lost on downs, leaving it Newburyport's ball in the center of the field.

Local High Schools Lost Saturday's Football Game 47 to 12.

Newburyport Played Best Game From Scientific Standpoint.

But Was Clearly Outclassed by Superior Weight of Salem.

The Newburyport High School football team, cheered on by about 100 fellow students, played a hotly contested game with the Salem High School team in Salem on Saturday. The game was called shortly after 3 o'clock. Messrs. Nelson and Perkins were chosen as referees and Parlon and Broadhead as timekeepers.

Capt. Colby won the toss and Salem kicked off. Greene caught the ball on the 20 yard line and advanced it to the 30 yard line. Colby then tried right tackle for no gain. On the next play the ball was fumbled, but recovered by Kelly who advanced it 5 yards. Pritchard took the ball for 4 yards through tackle. The ball then stood on the 20 yard line from which place Colby by a brilliant dash through Salem's big guard Roberts and a noble run down the field, scored a touchdown. The spectators cheered, tossed hats, waved banners and in every way showed intense excitement. It had taken less than two minutes to score a touchdown. Rollins kicked the goal.

Salem kicked off, and Greene, catching the ball, advanced it to the centre of the field. Colby went through right tackle for a gain of 3 yards. Hamilton tried end for no gain, and the ball went to Salem. By continued working of their big line, Salem forced the ball down the field. Goodhue scored a touchdown and kicked the goal. Rollins kicked off to Wade who advanced the ball to the 25 yard line. Salem's big line was used for repeated gains, and Wade took the ball over for a touchdown. Goodhue kicked the goal. Rollins kicked the ball out of bounds twice but Salem following him, was obliged to kick off. Wade caught the ball and advanced it to the 25 yard line. By plugging at the tackles Salem forced the ball down the field and Wade scored a touchdown. Goodhue kicked the goal.

Rollins kicked off to Wade who advanced it to the 30 yard line. By constant plugging at tackles and guards Salem forced the ball to the centre of the field when time was called. Score 22 to 12 in Salem's favor.

At the 10 minute intermission the Salem team retired to the club quarters, and hospitably allowed the visiting team to stay outside.

In the second half little interest was taken in the game. Salem's great weight proving to be too much for the little fellows. At all times the game was clearly in Salem's favor. Salem scored four touchdowns, from which Goodhue kicked as many goals. They were made by the following men in the order given. McGlew, Goodhue, Driscoll, Goodhue.

In this half Capt. Colby running in pursuit of McGlew dove and tackled him from behind, stopping him short. Colby was by long odds the best player on the field.

HAD THE USUAL KICK.

Haverhill-Newburyport Football Game Ended in a Dispute.

Newburyport Had Scored Six to Haverhill's Nothing.

Local Team Played Much Better Game Than Their Opponents.

It is a matter for regret that nearly every game played with Haverhill, be it base ball or foot ball, ends in a dispute and this was the result of yesterday's football contest between the high school eleven.

Newburyport was the winner by a score of 6 to 0, the goal being secured in the first half.

In the second neither side scored, after playing 6 1-2 minutes. The kick was over a decision of Referee Jacoby. Haverhill had worked the ball down to Newburyport's end, and the "doctor" had called third-down with two yards to gain. Haverhill made their fourth down without making the gain, leaving the ball withing six inches of the goal line, so the referee said. Then, of course, it was Newburyport's ball—and then there was a "song and dance coming." The angry voices and gesticulations, the denudations of the referee filled the air with discord and excitement.

Haverhill claimed that it was only the third down. Then a Haverhill man pushed the ball up to the white mark, when the ball was not really in play and attempted to make it a touchdown. Dave Ricks, Newburyport's centre, was there and prevented this decidedly "Spanish" move.

Then there was a long "chew" between the captain, the referee and the umpire, all to no purpose. Captain Colby offered to play it over, but Captain Tuck was not satisfied, so Captain Colby decided to stand by the referee's decision and the Haverhill fellows in high dudgeon left the field.

It was a slippery day for football, the grounds were wet and the ball as elusive as an eel about to be relieved of its skin. Newburyport high outplayed their opponents, the slippery piskin being the only thing working to their disadvantage. The first half was as good an exhibition as any enthusiast would like to see. The best work done for the visitors was that of Tuck, Reagan, Connor and Smith, especially Connor, who was struttin' with the ball for most of the end and through the line plays.

Colby, the plucky little captain of the Newburyport high, and his enthusiastic boys were in the game all over, both in offensive and defensive work.

At the start Haverhill won the toss and chose the north goal, to defend. Haverhill's kick-off brought only a small gain, but they repeated it so often, that the ball was down on the Newburyport's 35 yard line when an unlucky fumble put the ball in possession of Newburyport. Greenleaf falling upon it, Colby went through the line two or three times. Sid Rollins made a fine gain around Haverhill's left end and Newburyport continued to force the ball.

Newburyport was given 15 yards on an off-the-play. Colby flew over the heads of the Haverhill's men like a bird, for 10 yards. The home team kept forcing the ball toward their opponent's goal. Pritchard found a hole between Haverhill's right tackle and guard big enough to get through and made a pretty touchdown in 6 1-2 minutes' play. Sid Rollins kicked a goal.

In the next period Haverhill went into the game with more energy than displayed in the first half, but lost on four downs.

Colby went around the ends and leaped over the Haverhill's heads for gains, Smith

made a brilliant run around Haverhill's left end for all of 20 yards, but had the ball knocked out of his hands when it looked like a touchdown. Haverhill moved to back several notches and lost the ball on down. Then a fumble lost the ball and Haverhill's little regained it.

Colby went forward through right tackle and end for 15 yards. Pritchard had the sphere knocked from his hands over the line into a Haverhill player's hands.

Haverhill gained continually through the line and around the ends until the ball had been worked down to Newburyport's 15-yard line, when a fumble gave it to Newburyport.

Smith got 15 yards on a criss cross and Rollins worked the same racket for 20 yards more. Then there were short gains by Pritchard and Smith through an end and tackles and Colby around the right end.

Time was up and the ball was on Haverhill's 15-yard line.

In the second half Haverhill kicked to Brown, who muffed it. Smith got the ball. Pritchard, Colby and Greene made advances and then Haverhill got the ball on a fumble.

Haverhill put some life into the work and gained continually, forcing it back to Newburyport's 15-yard line. Here after four downs, Haverhill lost the ball to Newburyport, when it was within six inches of the goal line. According to the rules this decision is
wrong as the rules say when a man is
pushed back over the line by his oppo-

It is called a safety when a player re-
ceived an impetus from his own side or
runs back himself. Thus it is plainly
evident that the game should have been
2 to 0.

The contest opened by Rollins kicking
off for Newburyport. Harris caught the
ball and made a small gain. Newbury-
port got the ball on downs, but soon
fumbled and lost the ball to Haver-
hill. After short gains by Smith and
Lee, Greenleaf got the ball for New-
buryport. At this point of the game
Smith worked the criss-cross around left
end for 25 yards over the touchdown
line. Then the Newburyport contingent
were wild with enthusiasm thinking that
"Jake" had scored but the officials dis-
covered that he had gone out of bounds
at the 40 yard line.

The ball then changed hands many
times during the rest of the half. The
first half ended with the score 2 to 0.

After 15 minutes rest Lee kicked off to
Curtis, who advanced the ball five yards.
Smith fumbled on the criss-cross and Ha-
verhill got the ball on Newburyport's
three yard line. Here Greenleaf broke
through and got the ball on a fumble by
Harris, this being one of the prettiest
plays of the game. Rollins punted 3
yards, placing the ball out of danger.
Smith of Haverhill tried the end, but
"Smick" Plummer tackled like an old-

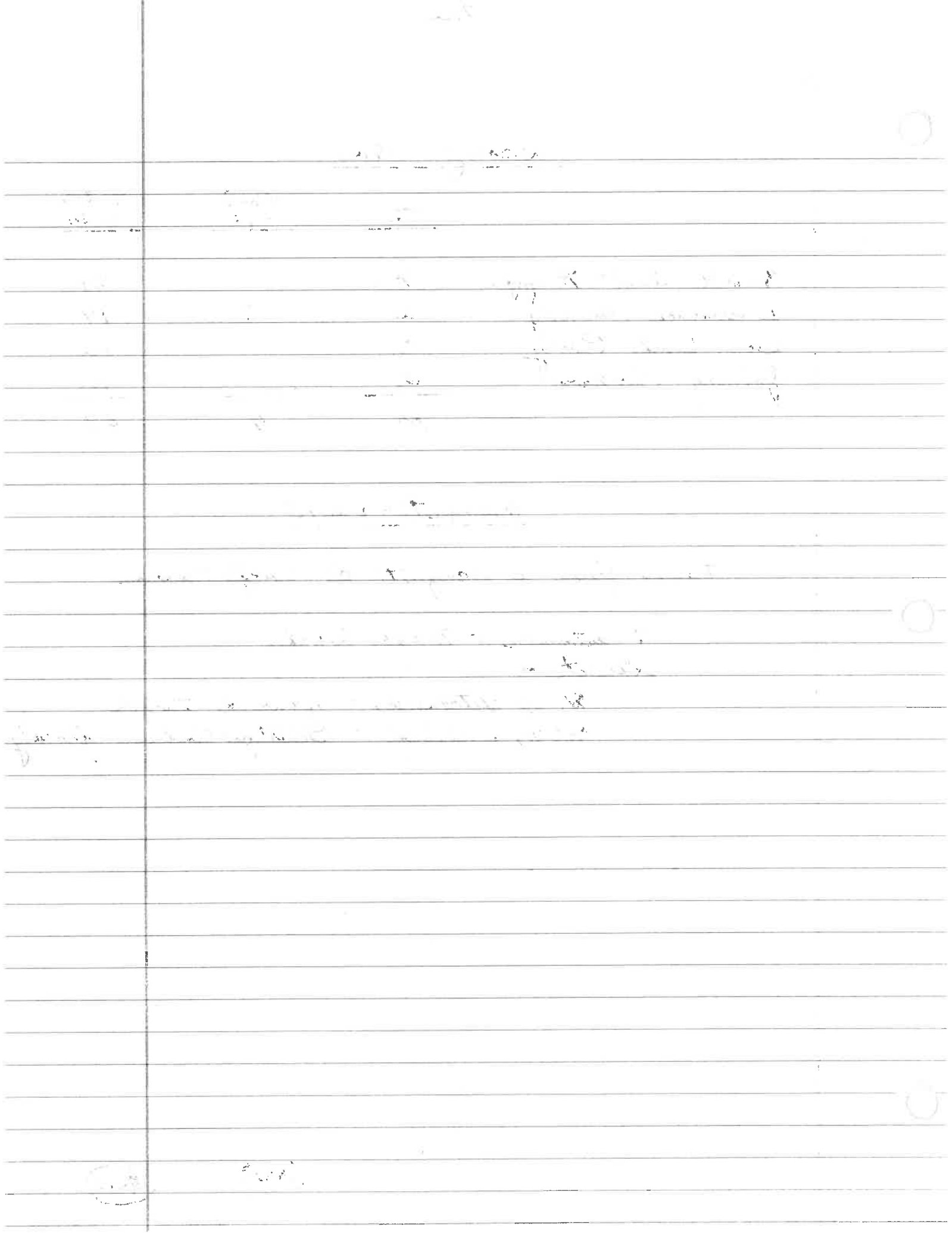

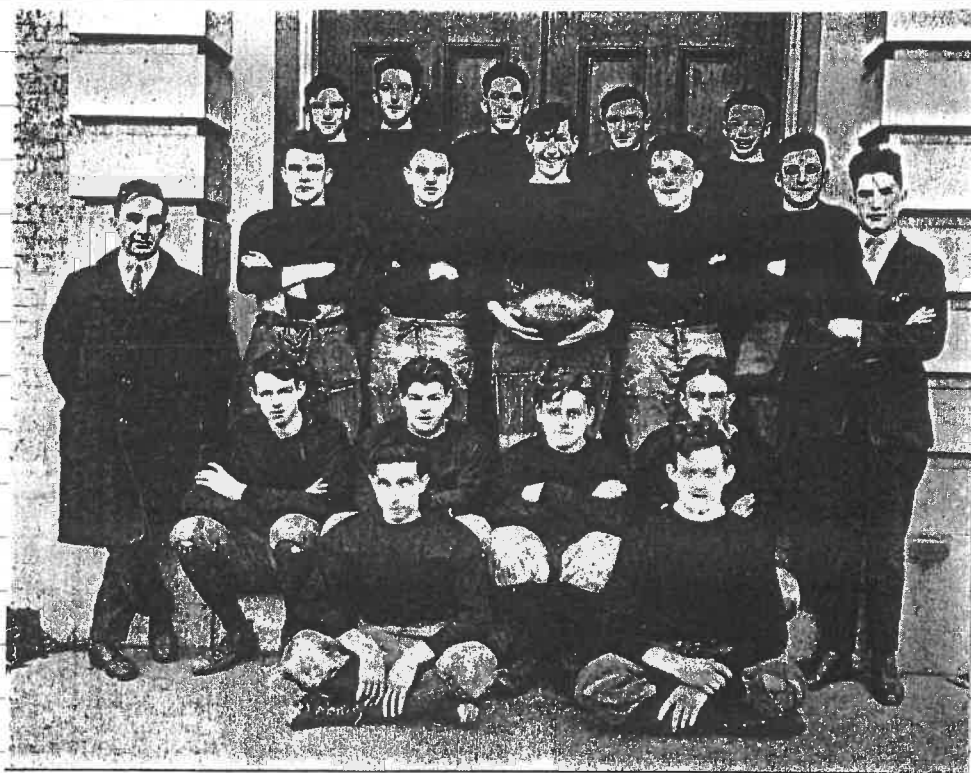
